

Kaitlin Aitken

Kaitlin Aitken is a multi-disciplined artist based in Orlando, Florida. Exposure to a vast assortment of art while growing up in the Philadelphia area helped to influence the artist she would become. Kaitlin's interest was initially sparked by classic animated features, which led to her exploration and training from the age of 5. A solid foundation of traditional techniques such as illustration, painting, sculpting, and design would all translate to the digital medium she commonly uses today. Other areas of Kaitlin's interest and inspiration include music, theater, and her love of animals.



Megan Bledsoe Ward

Composer and harpist Megan Bledsoe Ward has been hailed by Downbeat Magazine for her "sharp musical intelligence" and "scintillating plays of light and subtle colors." Her debut album, Pacific Harp Project, was awarded the 2016 Na Hoku Hanohano Award for Instrumental Album of the Year by the Hawaii Academy of Recording Arts. Ward holds B.M., M.M, M.A. degrees and a Performer's Certificate from the Eastman School of Music, and earned her D.M.A. at the University of Washington. Ward currently composes for chamber and orchestral ensembles, and performs as a soloist, orchestral harpist, and chamber musician, throughout the United States, serves as adjunct music professor with various universities in Hawaii, and teaches private harp and composition lessons. www.meganbledsoeward.com





**Ellie Cherry** 



She knew she wanted to dedicate her life to music when she began teaching herself piano at age 12, and she has since been an advocate for making the benefits of music education more accessible to a broader public. As both a performer and composer, Ellie sees music as a powerful medium for social change, a philosophy which has been instrumental in shaping her artistic voice. Minneapolis-based composer and harpist Amy Nam writes and performs music characterized by her sense of optimism and interest in unconventional timbres and structures. In 2018 her work Somewhere to Elsewhere, for harp and ensemble, won a BMI Student Composer Award. She holds degrees from Vanderbilt University, where she graduated with first honors as the Blair School of Music's Founder's Medalist,





McGill University, where she studied with John Rea, and the Eastman School of Music, where she studied with David Liptak, Robert Morris, and Ricardo Zohn-Muldoon.

Florence Price

Florence Beatrice (Smith) Price became the first black female composer to have a symphony performed by a major American orchestra when the Chicago Symphony Orchestra played the world premiere of her Symphony No. 1 in E minor on June 15, 1933. Florence Price's symphony had come to the attention of Stock when it won first prize in the prestigious Wanamaker Competition held the previous year. Although this premiere brought instant recognition and fame to Florence Beatrice Price, she would "continue to wage an uphill battle – a battle much larger than any war that pure talent and musical skill could win. It was a battle in which the nation was embroiled – a dangerous mélange of segregation, Jim Crow laws, entrenched racism, and sexism." (Women's Voices for Change, March 8, 2013). In your face I sometimes see Shadowings of the man to be, And, eager, Dream of what my son shall be, Dream of what my son will be, In twenty years and one.


When you are to manhood grown, And all your manhood ways are known, Then shall I, blissful, try to trace The child you once were in your face.

She has been commissioned to write compositions for many organizations, ensembles and individuals, including Manchester Jazz Festival, The Scottish Forestry Commission and Chamber Music Scotland. She has appeared one Radio 3, Radio 4, and Radio 6 with her own music as well as performing in festivals including WOMAD, The Dutch Harp Festival, Etno Krakow, The





Edinburgh International Book Festival and the Malaysian Book Festival. A fierce and open minded work ethic, alongside a desire to create and celebrate new music keeps Esther in constant demand, both locally and internationally, as she embraces her diverse and unique career.
